Aviation Maintenance: Students in Aviation Maintenance complete examinations mandated by the Federal Aviation Administration. There are no state-specific licensure requirements.

Certified Nursing Assistant: Graduates of the CNA Program complete the requirements for licensure in the state of Arkansas. Requirements for licensure and the user of the term “nursing assistant” versus “nurse’s aide” vary widely from state to state and may include state-specific examinations. The most common path to licensure outside of Arkansas in this case would be through reciprocity.

Phlebotomy: Students earning the Certificate of Proficiency in Phlebotomy complete the National Center for Competency Testing exam. Hospitals and medical facilities differ in terms of which national exam they require for employees to practice phlebotomy and there is no state-specific licensure requirement.

Emergency Medical Technician and Advanced EMT:

Emergency Medical Technician and Advanced EMT students complete the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians exam (NREMT). This national certification is a requirement for licensure in most states, however additional requirements vary.
